Be A Little Deaf

Last Friday saw the passing of Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Supreme Court Justice of the United States for 27 years. With her passing, in this hyper-polarized election year, political conversations are sure to become increasingly more hostile in the coming days. But perhaps RGB might leave us with some sound wisdom in this area.

No doubt, we would not agree with her on many important points. But even with those with whom we differ, we can find points of agreement. For example, you might agree with her advice on handling "thoughtless or unkind words."

Near the end of the preface to *My Own Words*, Ginsburg wrote:

Another often-asked question when I speak in public: "Do you have some good advice you might share with us?" Yes, I do. It comes from my savvy mother-in-law, advice she gave me on my wedding day. "In every good marriage," she counseled, "it helps sometimes to be a little deaf." I have followed that advice assiduously, and not only at home through fifty-six years of a marital partnership nonpareil. I have employed it as well in every workplace, including the Supreme Court of the United States. When a thoughtless or unkind word is spoken, best tune out. Reacting in anger or annoyance will not advance one's ability to persuade.

Recovering The Politics of Lincoln

Seems that there is not much that we can agree on today. But the one common variable that seems to cross the party divide is a bipartisan respect for the great emancipator, Abraham Lincoln.

Theodore Roosevelt (R) kept a portrait of Lincoln behind his desk and would turn to it in contemplation during difficult times. Franklin Roosevelt (D) made regular trips to the Lincoln memorial and once wrote to a friend, "I think it is time for us Democrats to claim Lincoln as one of our own." Republicans William McKinley, Gerald Ford, Ronald Reagan and John McCain, accepted their party's nomination for the presidency highlighting their allegiance to "The Party of Lincoln." Barack Obama cited Lincoln in his 2008 victory speech and took his first oath of office on the same Bible Lincoln used.

However, it is one thing to pay lip service to the legacy of a real leader; but, something quite different to follow his example.

In a recent issue of the National Review, historian Cameron Hilditch explains the complex but powerful political stance of our 16th president. He argues persuasively that Lincoln sought to balance the freedom of each citizen to pursue their own self interests with the need for the government to limit that freedom when it would restrict the rights of others (i.e. slavery). He summarizes by writing that Lincoln's America is "philosophically if not theologically, a kind of classical Christian America." And then he concludes by offering this advice to all political thinkers who would like to practice the politics of Lincoln:

To recover it, all we need to do is think seriously, deeply, and regularly about the fact that none of us are, in any intrinsic or objective way, better than the people whose politics we loathe. If you're interested in practicing the politics of Lincoln, try to bring to mind the person in public life whose views you find the most appalling, and meditate long and hard on the fact that they are your unalterable and inalienable equal. Our sixteenth president was quite adept at this. On the night that Robert E. Lee surrendered, Lincoln, after four years of being cursed, warred against, and burned in effigy by the soldiers of the South, turned to the White House band and asked them to play "Dixie."

The Donation Dollar

Like many charities in the United States, Australian not-forprofits are expecting a sharp decrease in donations during and after the COVID-19 pandemic. Economists forecasts an 18% shortfall over the next two years.

In response, the Australian mint has designed a brand new coin called the "donation dollar." The image of Queen Elizabeth II is pressed into the front of the coin. The reverse features a green center surrounded by an embossed message which reads "give to help others." The center is accented with a gold ripple design. According to the Australian Mint, the ripples symbolize the "ongoing, positive repercussions that each donation can make."

The coins, which are the first \$1 piece to feature a color other than gold, will be minted over the next three years. Twentyfive million in total will be put into circulation, one for every Australian. But officials have made it clear, the coins are not collectable or commemorative. Mint Chief Executive Ross MacDiarmid recently told ABC:

Hopefully, they will look at the message that is being conveyed on that coin and they will look to donate it. . . What we are trying to do here is get people to stop and reflect. If they did just that alone and thought about the idea of donating that in itself would be an amazing outcome. If ever there was a time of need, this is that time.

Someone Has a Fake

The headline of a recent TMZ article reads: "Two camps are claiming to be in possession of the REAL jersey worn by Michael Strahan in Super Bowl 42. . . which means someone has a FAKE."

Michael Strahan, Pro Football Hall of Famer, who wore the jersey, claims the real thing is on display at his home.

But Goldin Auctions, one of the top sports memorabilia dealers in the country, which prides itself on trading in authentic items, claims it holds the real thing and plans on putting it up for auction to the highest bidder.

Strahan claims after his NY Giants beat the New England Patriots on Feb. 3, 2008, he gave his jersey to a friend and instructed that person to take it straight to Strahan's hotel room for safekeeping.

But, Goldin Auctions is disputing that claim, insisting the REAL jersey ended up with a Giants equipment manager that day, who then passed it along to another person, who brought it to Goldin Auctions.

Without more information, we cannot be sure which one is right. But the one thing we can agree on is this, both jerseys cannot be real. One is authentic and the other is not. Or to put it in the words of TMZ, "someone has a FAKE."

Don't Scale Back God's Word

Genesis 17:15-21 Trusting the Promises of God

Back in the book of Genesis we find Abraham waiting on God to fulfill his promises. Sometimes we imagine these patriarchs were infused with perpetual confidence, but nothing could be further from the truth. After a while, Abraham begins to assume that the promise had already been fulfilled through Ishmael, his son through Hagar. But the promise was not just for him alone, it was for Abraham and Sarah as a couple. At the ages of 100 and 90, after waiting for decades, they would have another child.

When Abraham hears the full measure of God's plan, that the foretold offspring would not be Ishmael but yet another son who would be born through Sarah, he literally fell down in laughter. In his mind, he was too old and Sarah was way too old. He took an inventory of his own abilities and resources, and then determined it to be unbelievable. But he had learned by this point that he must to trust God, who had proved himself to be faithful. What can he do?

Since he could not see this happening, he began to revise God's plan. Ok God, let's just call Ishmael the heir of promise and be done with it. Just let Ishmael walk before you!

And Abraham said to God, "Oh that Ishmael might live before you!" God said, "No, but Sarah your wife shall bear you a son, and you shall call his name Isaac – Genesis 17:18-19

There is a constant temptation to follow a path of least resistance. This is especially true in matters of faith. When waiting on God to fulfill his word, it is easy for us to give into an impulse to scale back his promises, to substitute what we can do in our own power rather than wait on what he can do with is, to settle for the second best of our own making rather than the very best of his will for us. But God's abilities exceed our abilities, his resources surpass our resources, and his promises can overrule our limited expectations.
